C. C. Chapman, publisher of the Oregon Voter, delivered an excellent address on why he thought the state income tax law should be repealed, and why he initiated the measure to be voted on this fall. He produced letters and other data showing that enterprises with payrolls were not coming into Oregon and would not come until the law is repealed. He is for an income tax, but not until our sister states pass a similar law. He was ably answered by Mr. Addis of the Oregon Farmer, who believes no concern is kept out of Oregon on account of the income tax, and defended it as a reasonable system because it caught the income man who

has no tangible property.

Friday afternoon the visiting ladies were taken to Lake Lvtel, where the women's club royally entertained them at luncheon and with a fine program. This lake is about 20 miles distant from Tillamook and one of the beauty spots of Oregon.

Friday night a bountiful banquet was served by the women's auxiliary to the American Legion, and about 400 done ample justice to a well served meal. The banquet was served in the large armory. Fred Lockey acted as toastmaster, and he is a good one. Responses were made made by many editors and citizens of Tillamook. The main address was given by Prof. C. sion at Eugene. He represented a Detroit paper in France during the famous Dreyfus case. At the close of the banquet, a 5-pound cheese was presented each of the 200 editors present—a magnificent and costly present from President Haverlack of the Tillamook Cooperative Cheese association.

Saturday morning a tour of the cheese plants was made, and this to most of the editors was intensely interesting. At each of the plants a different stage of cheese making was seen, this happening because of the different time of arrival. Pres. Haverlack, with whom we rode on this tour, told us they were spending \$30,000 a year in advertising and that Tillamook cheese sold at a 10c premium over any other cheese

on the coast.

At noon the editors and their wives were guests of the Whitney Lumber Co. and taken on an inspection trip through one of best mills in the state, every department being electrically driven. A cafeteria dinner was also served to the visitors. A group picture was taken of the visitors at this mill, which is located at Garibaldi.

Saturday evening the visitors were taken to Oceanside, a new beach being opened by Roseberg Bros. of Tillamook, where a camp supper jointly served by them and the Associated Industries of Oregon was hugely enjoyed. Around a camp fire new words to oldtime tunes were sung and good story tellers kept a happy crowd in a happy con-

dition. Those who wanted to dance could do so, for it was also free.

The Kiwanis club, the printing shops, in fact everybody, made it a point to cooperate to make the stay of the editors one long to be remembered, and they succeeded.

The 1925 convention will be held at Grants Pass, and it's possible a trip to Oregon Caves and Crater Lake will be a part of the entertainment.
