HOLT-RAMSDELL REUNION

The fifth annual Holt-Ramsdell family reunion was held at Camp Santiam, Jefferson, Ore., on Sunday Aug. 3, 1924, with about 60 relatives present.

Thomas Holt was one of the early pioneers of Oregon, having crossed the plains with oxteam in 1844. Like most of the pioneers, he fought in the Indian wars, and he also spent some time in the mines of California in 1848-9.

In 1846 the Caldwells also crossed the plains, coming in part way with oxteam and the remainder on foot. Mr. Caldwell had twin daughters, Lione and Lurilla, who were married on the same day, the former to Thomas Holt and the latter to Thos. Ramsdell.

Mr. and Mrs. Holt settled on the Holt donation land claim, one mile south of Jefferson, where they raised a large family of 12 children, nine of whom survive, and six were in attendance at the reunion. They were: T. M. Holt, W. H. Holt and J. G. Holt of Scio; U. G. Holt and Mrs. W. H. Nicolson of Salem, and Mrs. T. J. Butler of Albany.

Mr. Ramsdell, being a Methodist minister, lived for a time in various cities of Oregon, Washington and California, and spent his last years in Portland. They also raised a large family of 12 children, four of

whom survive, three being present at the reunion—John Ramsdell, Mrs. S. W. Anderson and Mrs. Mary E. Dixon, all of Portland.

Included in the reunion and holding a prominent place was Mrs. J. A. Vaughan of Jefferson, she being the only surviving member of the original families. She is a half sister of Mrs. Holt and Mrs. Ramsdell. Their brother, M. G. Caldwell, married Lizzie Abbott of Scio, and they spent a large part of their lives in Jefferson. Their only surviving daughter, Mrs. W. A. Kotthoff of Jefferson, and her family were included in the reunion.

The day was spent in renewing old acquaintances and in repeating pleasant recollections of days gone by. A sumptuous banquet was served, and later in the evening the younger generation took a dip in the cool Santiam, after which all were served to brick ice cream and all departed for their homes with a feeling of a day well spent and a determination to be on hand again next year.

Interest is still manifest in the community club meetings, which was made clear at the Crabtree meeting last Monday night. Some disappointment was felt at the failure of the boy singer from Salem to be present, and also the absence of C. E. Spence, for which no explanation could be made, as none had been received from either.

The meeting was called to order by President J. W. Miller, Mrs. S. B. Holt presided at the piano and the audience joined most lustily in singing "America."

After a short business session, in which it was again decided to stage a community fair at Scio on Saturday, September 13, at which time a community exhibit will be selected for the county fair which starts on Sept. 17 for four days, the speaker of the evening, W. A. Delzell, secretary of the state board of control, was introduced.

Mr. Delzell is a pleasing speaker, and will always find a welcome among our people. He is chuck full of illustrative stories to make his points more clear. He is perfectly cognizant of the plight the producers and wage earners are in, and says they have blindly followed some leader who advocated more and more bonds, which six years ago could have been paid with 50c per capita, but today it would take \$90 per capita to wipe the slate clean. On the state income tax question he is eminently sound, for he showed that over \$1,000,000 had been collected so far, and most of it from people who had no tangible property for which to pay taxes on, but did have an income. Rightly, he says, this shifts part of the tax burden onto those who have escaped in the past.

The next speaker was Supt. Gilbert of the boys' training school, who gave some interesting information on what the school was trying to do for the unfortunate boys. He says the boys at heart are not bad, and most of them are amenable to kindness, and asked his hearers to visit the school whenever they can. It is quite probable the school band will furnish music for the children's day at the Linn county fair.

The next meeting of the club will be held in Scio in the afternoon of the community fair, at which time John L. Brady, editor of the Pacific Homestead, will speak.
