Debates are the bunk when it comes to challenging political issues or candidates. Witness the Kroner-McCamant fiasco in Portland the other night. Neither side had an issue worthy of debating, but each saw to it that sufficient numbers of friends were there to lustily cheer an imaginary point. Both speakers left the hall decidedly whipped, because both had not been convincing enough to win a single vote for their candidate.

SCATHING INDICTMENT

Those two Chicago girls who recently killed a woman in Chicago in order that they might get money to buy clothes, are a part of the youngsters that compose three-fourths of the cases before the courts today. The girls gave a mighty scathing indictment of their parents when they said "Our parents didn't care what we done or where we went." Is it possible the parents of our youngsters care not where the boy or girl is or what they are doing? If they think more of their personal freedom than they do of the purity and wholesomeness of their child, why bring children into the world to become burdensome to neighbors or to society? No parent should go unpunished when it is proven "they didn't care where their children are or what they did." When a man lets his stock get out and forage on

another's crop, he must pay the damage, hence he keeps his fences in repair and stock well protected. Why should not the same law apply when he allows his children to run wild.

Judge Taylor of New York City, when administering the oath of office to a new judge, said "your heart will bleed as never before when three-fourths of the cases that you will hear are youths from 14 to 22 years." This is a mighty serious problem for the courts, which they have to solve, because they must do what the parents should have done, administer corrective punishment.

WHEN WE UNDERSTAND

"We declare that all men, when they form a social compact, are equal in right; that all power is inherent in the people, and all free governments are founded on their authority, and instituted for their peace, safety and happiness; and they have at all times a right to alter, reform, or abolish the government in such manner as they may think proper."

The above is section 1 of the Bill of Rights under the constitution of the state of Oregon. In the eyes of some men, who are not acquainted with this most excellent document, the above paragraph will be declared "red" propaganda. The above is also a part of the Declaration of Independence, upon which the constitution of the United States is founded. It is not dangerous to our safety nor our government for one man or a set of men to cry out against continued wrongs, and to demand that the perpetrators of the wrongs be punished, whether they are supreme court judges or just plain folks.

The Tribune welcomes the plan to have students in school study the constitution. The more it is studied by the girls and boys the better citizens they will become—they will know their rights as citizens, how laws are passed and how administered, how they may demand their rights under the law and just what the judges can do and how far they may go in interpreting the law. As intelligent citizens they will know that congress is elected by the people and as a consequence represents the will of the people. They will know that the U. S. Supreme Court is partisan, appointed by a partisan president, and hold office for life. They will therefore reason that their government will be just as safe in the people as in the keeping of the nine men constituting the Supreme Court today.

Radical changes from old established customs are not born overnight; they are spread before the people only after men have been denied redress by the powers that be. If we don't want to hear of radical changes from established customs, the only solution is to find the cause and remove it. Mankind is long-suffering and it is only when the load gets too heavy that he begins to cry aloud. When the people understand what the constitution guarantees them, it is safe to say there will be fewer and better laws passed, that congress will look more to the happiness and prosperity of the country, and that the Supreme Court will not devote itself to declaring laws unconstitutional that protect our children. It will be a great day when we understand the constitution and what it guarantees us—no politician can pull the wool over our eyes when we do.

Why Millions Leave Farms

Seven hundred thousand workmen, in 23 leading manufacturing industries, are receiving wages today which are equivalent in purchasing power to \$1.27, as compared with \$1 in 1914. This statement is made by the U. S. National Industrial Conference Board. On the other hand this authority states, that notwithstanding the recent advance made in prices of some farm products, the farmer's dollar will buy 85 cents' worth as compared with ten years ago. In other words the dollar of organized trades workmen is worth \$1.27 and that of the unorganized farmer 85 cents—a difference of 42 cents. This statement explains why millions are leaving the farms and finding work in the industrial cities. The high priced dollar is stripping the farms.
