In keeping with this belief, he will, if elected, ask the next legislature to reduce the salary of the office from \$2,000 per year to \$1,600 per year, which is approximately an average of the salaries paid the various officers of Linn County.

The County Judge, Commissioners, Assessor, and School Superintendent, which are more important offices to the taxpayers and harder to fill with competent officers, than the office of County Clerk, are paid from \$1,200 to \$1,800 per year. Is not that unjust and unbusinesslike?

\$2,000 per year is more than is necessary to pay to get the same class of service in the office as heretofore. Our County Assessor and Recorder are both fully qualified to fill the office of Clerk, yet they are candidates to succeed themselves at salaries of \$1,500 and \$1,600 per year. As further proof that \$2,000 is an unnecessarily large salary for the taxpayers to pay for this office, you are cited to the fact that some six years ago, the present Clerk took a reduction of \$500 per year rather than change to private lines of work. No private individual or company would think of paying 25% more salary than necessary to secure competent help.
