the circuit court bench, and his name will have to be written in on the ballot. Never having mixed in politics, he is not well known, but is thoroughly competent to discharge the important duties of judge with fairness and impartiality.

Prominent visitors in Scio yesterday were L. H. McMahon of Salem, who is seeking election to the office of circuit judge for Linn and Marion counties, now holding the position by appointment of Gov. Pierce. The other is M. D. Shanks of Lebanon, who accompanied Mr. McMahon. The judge is a republican and is well known in this county. His name will have to be written in. He is fearless, honest and will make a good judge if the voters see fit to elect him.

The greatest enemy to our country is ignorance. How can it be cured? That is the question confronting the nation today. Illiterate and ignorant people disobey laws and commit crimes through ignorance. Ignorance is dangerous. Libraries can overcome it a great deal, but it can be cured only by continuous reading and talking with others. We cannot keep on going to school, years after year, but we must keep on studying and learning. The world stops for nobody. Those who stop learning will never catch up.

Here is one condition in Soviet Russia that it seems would appeal to many in this country, judging by the frequency they are getting into and out of the matrimonial harness: Under the Soviet laws of Russia a man can have thirty wives in ten years, but no more. There, a woman is allowed to name the father of her child, and have the parentage recorded by the Soviet, despite the alleged father's denial. Efforts have been made to transplant Russian bolshevism in America without success. It is regretted that we have a few who are willing to sanction anything that personally appeals to their depraved natures.

H. S. Nolan is making an ag-

gressive campaign for the office of county clerk. If elected, he says he will ask the legislature to reduce the pay of the clerk from \$2000 to \$1600 per year. This is showing the taxpayers how to reduce. But in spite of this, we find from interviews that a majority of voters favor re-electing R. M. Russell. We might keep still on such matters of this nature, but we are giving this information for whatever news value it may have. In this connection we wish to say that the front page story "Measures and Men," this paper's recommendations are intended only upon the measures, which comprises the first column, while the second column is only a resume of the findings after interviews.

Those political spellbinders seem now to know just precisely what happened to the farmers and they all have legislation remedies they are going to put through just as soon as the people place them in power. But can anyone tell us exactly what those remedies are and how they will work to the interest of the agriculturists to any degree of betterment than the previous campaign promises. Talk is the cheapest commodity on the market about this time of the campaign year, and while the farmer is always willing to listen attentively he is getting a little more weary in swallowing the lose of campaign promises that are practically guaranteed to lift him out of his financial troubles. The farmer has learned to look with skepticism on promised legislation for his benefit, and the past few years have taught him a number of very sure ways he can work toward his own salvation. If the politician can do anything to help the farmer, why don't he get busy and do it? Not be eternally making promises which so far he has failed to fill.

This is one of the years when the country is headed for eternal destruction. It has the bad habit of getting headed in that direction once every four years, and the politicians get us all riled up and rallying around the flag in order to save it for the dear people. We no more than get the old continent staked down again and are lulled to sleep by the promises of security, when politics begins putting the skids under again in readiness to start things rolling toward perdition when the next four-year period rolls around. This saving the country every four years at the cries of the politicians is not only costly but is getting tiresome. Let's wake up and keep awake, and keep rallying around the old flag every day in the year. Let's put men in office who are the right sort, regardless of what the politicians would like to have us do, and if they are not the right sort let's not leave them there to create a big mess that will have to be cleaned up at the end of four years, but get rid of them immediately, kick them out and keep the records clean. This is a mighty fine country, one which any good man or woman should consider it a great honor to serve with every ounce of their energy and honesty. If they can't measure up to that common standard they should be promptly led to the way out and the skids greased. The only saving our country

needs is to save it from the politicians who make a paying business out of politics.
