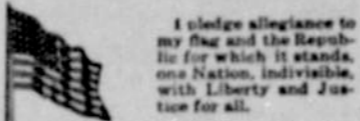

VOTERS ARE QUEER

Every voter is sovereign when he goes into the booth on election day.

He is supreme. He is lord at that moment of all he surveys. He can place men of his choice in responsible positions who will or will not enforce the laws; he can pass constitutional amendments or repeal amendments.

Two years ago, the legislature of Oregon passed a law prohibiting the use of skimmed milk in oleomargarine, but permitting the use of whole milk before the butterfat is removed, and immediately Swift & Co. enjoined that law and started a referendum, with the result that the law was repealed by a very large vote. And now we will have a substitute for butter made from oils imported from abroad and churned with skimmed milk. Oregon is a dairy state, too.

The state income tax law passed in 1923 amid great rejoicing by the legislature and some of the men who sponsored the law. It was a fine law until some large income was hit by its operation, and then it became a menace. "Over forty million dollars in new enterprises were kept out of the state" so the monied men of Portland and downstate informed the voters during the campaign. The voters believed it and repealed the law. Money, it seems, is our God, and if the dollar is taxed we immediately spend huge sums to remove the tax. In the meantime, the farmer and his property (which is tangible) and the small home owner in cities and towns see their taxes going higher and higher, while money (which is not tangible) almost always goes tax free. Yes, we repealed the income tax law and the million or more dollars thus raised will now be added to the farm and town property. When it comes to taxing money, we hasten to condemn it, and in doing so we never look at our own tax receipt before voting.

As voters we are queer.

EDUCATION VS. CIVILIZATION

Editor Scio Tribune:
 In looking over the annals of history, it seem strange that degradation and shame always follow education and civilization. When Greece and Rome attained the zenith of their enlightenment, they went down. The more educated and enlightened the people and nations become, the more unjust and intolerant they grow. Education, which is said to be the mother of civilization, ought to make people more just and humane, and when it does not do this, it becomes a misnomer, which has ended the nations that have preceded us. The boast of our educated and enlightened nation, as being the grandest in all history, overlooking the fact that rot and decay is slowly eating their way into the very vitals of the U.S.A. The people are becoming more and more intolerant of each other's rights. Corruption in state and national affairs is growing by leaps and bounds, and the mystery to me is why an educated and enlightened people will uphold such procedure by this sacred right of franchise.

But such is the history of the ancient and modern world.

It has been said "You cannot enslave a free, educated and enlightened people." But we have no maxim saying they can not enslave themselves, which we are sure rapidly doing.

There are two kinds of slavery. One is self-imposed, the other is put over by political privileges and skulduggery.

When we voted to put ourselves in bondage to debt, build good roads, issue bonds, pay interest, etc., we were playing to the selfish interest of the moneylenders, saying they should not be taxed nor pay taxes upon their money invested in this way, which has placed the whole burden of taxation upon land. As a consequence, 1,800,000 farmers have gone broke in the last two years, and all are headed that way. Yet amid our complaint of high taxes, I believe the people as a whole, rather than go back to the horse and buggy, wagon

and team and muddy roads, would vote another tax of 10,000,000 dollars in bonds upon our county.

This reminds me of the time when we voted the 600,000 dollars on our county from which we were going to build 250 miles of hard surfaced road in Linn county. The money is gone, where is the hard surfaced roads? Not a mile of it built in the county, as was designated upon the blue print maps when putting it over—Let us grow!

Taxes don't amount to anything. It won't be long until the "Sky line" along the summit of the Cascade mountains will be built. Governor Pierce thinks so, and we will out swifter Switzerland in his opinion, and we will have the grandest scenic highway in all the world.

Now, let the farmers borrow all the money they can get on their farms, let the bankers foreclose on them, and put Japs, Dagoes, and Russians upon them, cheap labor, so they can make interest in what they have loaned on them, and let the old farmer and their families ride the skyline highway. They have worked long enough. Let them have a little pleasure and recreation.

There was an announcement made some years ago by a secret financial conspiracy in this country, who declared that a "national debt was a national blessing. A state debt was a state blessing, and individual debt an individual blessing. The bigger the debt the bigger the blessing." That it put energy and pep into people to make money, and upon this hellish doctrine, the individual, the state and nation are working in unison to carry it out.

Generations yet unborn must slave their lives away, in the perpetrating of this thing upon them, until our nation goes down in rock and ruin, as others have gone and other people will read our epitaph, "Gone, but not forgotten."

WHY SPUDS ARE LOW IN PRICE

Because the Oregon crop of spuds shows a low yield this year, on account of the extremely dry season, many growers ask the state market agent why the market prices are so low. The Idaho, Oregon and Montana yield is estimated to be one million bushels short of last year, but the estimates of the whole country show an increased production over 1923 of eighteen million bushels. Oregon is but a small factor in potato production. It's estimated production this year is less than 4,000,000 bushels, while Washington's is over 21,000,000 and the country at large 178,000,000.
