PAID IN ADVANCE

Beginning January 1 we will blue pencil all subscriptions that expire within two or three weeks. So if you see a blue pencil mark under your name, you will know what it means. If you want the paper to keep coming, you will have to renew. Credit is easy to get, but day is forgotten. The business houses from whom we have to buy, say "30 days" or not more goods. We have mailed statements to many of our readers since we took over the Tribune, with no response from most of them, and a few days after the receipt of the third statement, refused the paper and paying not a cent on what he owed. These unfair methods cause us to reflect on the old saying, "extend credit to a friend and you thereby have lost a friend." And it's true.

We are making a special effort to get those who know they owe us to pay up. We are giving the same inducements to new subscribers—\$1.00 for the year 1925. The coupon published last week said the paper would stop at expiration unless renewed. That is just what will happen. Our paper and postage bill every week amounts to more than we receive each week on subscriptions. Therefore, why should your home paper extend credit, when willingly, gladly you pay in advance for your papers from a distance—those papers never boost your community, nor tell of your achievements, your good luck, nor sympathize with you in your misfortune; neither do they pay taxes, support your local enterprises, such as churches, schools, etc., all of which your local paper does.

And because of all the above facts The Scio Tribune must go on a cash in advance program Jan. 1, 1925. You will like it better, because it is paid for and will stop when time expires. We will like it better, because friendships will not be broken and all of us be placed on an equal.
