**Effective March 1**

Agent J. F. Wesely has received notice that the American Railway Express Co. has made a reduction of from 15% to 32% on express rates, effective March 1. The new rates from here to Portland will be 65c for 50 pounds or 95c for 100 pounds of first class; 49c and 71c for second class; to Seattle, \$1.10 and \$1.85, first class, 82c and \$1.39 second class; to San Francisco, \$1.87 and \$3.40 first class, \$1.40 and \$3.25 second class. This brings express shipments down to parcel post, or nearly so, and therefore is the best means of transporting merchandise.
