George Compton Passes

George W. Compton, 71, pioneer of 1853, died at his home in Lebanon at 5 o'clock Friday, Feb. 6, following a stroke of apoplexy on the preceding Saturday, from which he never regained consciousness.

The deceased was born in Washington county, Missouri, April 16, 1853, and when but 11 days old his parents started by ox team across the plains to Oregon. Upon arrival in Oregon they first settled in Benton county, latter moving to a farm six miles from Scio, where he lived until 11 years ago, when he moved to Lebanon. Mrs. Compton died in 1919.

Mrs. Melinda Compton, of Scio, was visiting at her son's home when he was stricken, and the stroke was a hard blow to her on account of her advanced age. Besides his aged mother, he is survived by five children: Mrs. Hazel Moore of Tigard, Guy Compton of Antelope, Lola Compton of Santa Barbara, Calif., Clarence Compton of Lebanon and Claude Compton of Seattle. Four brothers and three sisters survive: John Compton of Silverton, Otto Compton of Spokane, Clay Compton of Independence, Charles Compton of Scio, Mrs. Emma Griggs of Salem. Mrs. Martha Bishop of Red Bluff, Calif., and Mrs. Mattie Arkison of Baker.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church in Lebanon at 11 o'clock Saturday morning, and burial took place at Providence.
