HUNDREDS COME TO ATTEND DRAWING

Autos Line Streets for Blocks Waiting for Prize Drawing and Free Show

Yesterday was the day for the drawing for the second and third prizes offered by the merchants of Scio to stimulate cash buying and good will, and it was surely reflected in the happy, expectant faces of the hundreds who came and waited until the hour for the drawing arrived.

At 10 o'clock the hour for the drawing was set by lot. The numbers were on the half hour, and a young lad drew 1:15. Promptly at that hour a young girl was blindfolded, the names well shaken up in a barrel. Ten names were drawn from the barrel, and L. A. Poindexter was the 10th, thus winning the second prize. The same process was gone through for the third prize, Truman Lukenbach being the lucky man. The value of the prizes totaled \$30--\$20 and \$10.

From every standpoint it is believed the affair was a success, to both consumer and merchant, and paves the way for future courtesies between merchant and customer.

The last drawing takes place Saturday, when the grand prize, a \$70 radio set, will be awarded to some lucky person. The same procedure to find the winner will be followed as was used yesterday. Every article given away was purchased from a Scio firm. It pays to trade with home merchants who advertise.

The free show was a fine comedy by the man who never laughs, Buster Keaton, in "Hospitality." The Peoples Theatre was packed to the doors, and the people enjoyed the show immensely, thus showing the appreciation of the hospitality of the merchants and John Wesely.

Wayne and Verl, the next older brother, had been quite ill with whooping cough for several weeks, and last week Wayne developed pneumonia, which in turn caused obstruction of the bowels. On Monday his condition became so serious that it was decided that an operation was necessary. He was taken to Albany where he was operated upon in the afternoon.

He is survived by his parents, five brothers, his grandparents, and other relatives.

Funeral services will be held at 11 o'clock this morning at the Christian church in Scio, the Rev. W. H. Lee of Albany officiating, and burial will be at Lebanon.

Mr. and Mrs. F. T. Thayer, Mrs. Shelton's parents, will have been married 40 years in April; they have 10 children and 20 grandchildren, and this is the first death in their immediate family.

Wm. J. Wilson Found Dead

Last Wednesday at noon Wm. J. Wilson, who lived on the West Scio road about 4½ miles west of Scio, was found dead in his barn, where he had gone to do some chores about 11 o'clock. When he did not come in at the dinner hour, his father went to call him, making the find as stated above. The body was lying on a pile of hay in a natural position, thus causing the belief the deceased had felt faint and had laid down there to rest when heart failure or apoplexy seized him and life became extinct.

W. J. Wilson was born on the farm where he died 43 years ago, or on Nov. 16, 1882, and had known no other home. On October 12, 1904, he was married to Lillie E. Price, who with one son, Wm. Woodrow, aged six years, and Wanda, a 19-months old daughter, survive. The deceased is also survived by his aged father, W. Wilson, and three sisters, Mrs. Maggie Quigley of near Scio, Mrs. Sarah Derrick of Rogue River, Ore., Mrs. Wallace Perry of Wolf Point, Mont.

Mr. Wilson was prominent in the Masonic fraternity, having filled all the chairs in his local lodge, and the funeral services were held in Jefferson at 1 o'clock Friday under Masonic auspices, Rev. Erstine, pastor of the Evangelical church at Jefferson, delivering the eulogy. Burial was made in the Miller cemetery near Sheburn.

The pall bearers were A. D. Hinz, Tim Kelly, Jas. Johnston, Dan McLachlan, D. C. Thoms and Carl W. Bragg.

TWO BUSINESSES CHANGE HANDS

Shelton Bros. and Holechek Bros. Sell Their Markets to C. J. Bruce

Monday morning a deal was completed through Tom Large, realtor, whereby the two meat markets in Scio are merged into one, Shelton Bros. and Holechek Bros. disposing of their businesses to C. J. Bruce.

Floyd and Herbert Shelton have been conducting their business in the Wesely building for the past two years, having moved from their former location in the hotel block, and put in a refrigerating plant to care for their meats and made other improvements. By their pleasing personality they have built up a fine trade and became a real asset to the community.

Jerry and Walter Holechek opened their market in Scio nine years ago, and purchased the building and ground where they were located. By strict attention to business and courteous treatment they also built up a fine trade. Two or more years ago this firm put in a refrigerating plant, and their business has steadily grown since.

C. J. Bruce is a newcomer to our community, having recently traded a large mercantile stock at Falls City to A. A. Muck for his ranch about three miles east of the city. The butcher business is not new to him. He will enlarge as soon as possible, and will handle all kinds of meat, and plans to erect a slaughter house on his ranch and do his own killing. Herbert Shelton has been employed by Mr. Bruce to be his meat cutter and wait on the trade.

Floyd Shelton is undecided as to the future, but will probably remain in Scio. The Holechek boys will finish the improvements now being made on their ranch, after which they may make a visit to Texas, their former homes.

Both retiring firms have been fair and honest in all their dealings with the public, and they will be missed from the business circles. The new proprietor comes to us with a fine record as a business man, and we bespeak for him a cordial welcome by the public. We understand the transfer in toto takes place March 1st, which includes the building and ground owned by Holechek's. But one shop will be operated, the one in the Wesely building.
