PAPERS CONSOLIDATE

Last Wednesday evening it was announced in Albany that a company had been formed to consolidate the Herald with the Democrat, and on Monday the consolidation was completed when the new paper, "The Democrat-Herald," made its appearance.

The Herald was in its 50th year and had been republican in politics all its life. The Democrat was the spokesman of the democratic party, though in later years has been independent, and with this merger the two major parties are left without an official spokesman in Linn county, as we understand the agreement is that the new publication must be independent politically.

From a business standpoint, the merger is a good thing for the advertiser and publisher—the expense will be less to the former and the profits greater to the latter. It is said neither in several years had made a cent, because of the heavy overhead to each and the extra expense to the advertiser forbid consistent use of printer's ink. The merger is said to give the new publication a circulation of 5200, being the largest for any town the size of Albany in Oregon.

In making the deal, it is said the merchants signed a contract not to advertise in any other paper for a period of five years. This is real helpfulness to an enterprising newspaper and is cooperation with home industry. If all merchants in every community where there is a newspaper would cooperate with that paper to the fullest extent, there would soon be a newspaper of influence and affluence in that communi-

ty second to none anywhere. No matter how small the business, it can be enlarged by the judicious use of the community newspaper, and by reason of increased advertising the newspaper can and does expand—in fact both grow and expand together, or both fail from lack of support by the merchant and community.

We prophesy the merger will reflect credit upon Albany, Linn county and the new management.
