C. M. Brewer Honored

C. M. Brewer, vice-president and general manager of the Mountain States Power company, with headquarters at Albany, was elected a member of the board of directors of Standard Gas & Electric Company, parent company of Mountain States Power Company, in Chicago, Wednesday, March 25, according to announcement just received from H. M. Byllesby & Co. Mr. Brewer's election comes as recognition of his long, successful service as an executive of the Mountain States Power Co. Standard Gas & Electric Co. and its operated companies comprise one of the largest public utility groups in the country with ownership distributed among more than 80,000 shareholders. Mr. Brewer's election is in line with the policy of the company of broadening responsibilities among executives of its operated companies.

Mr. Brewer joined the Byllesby organization in August, 1909, at Muskogee, Okla., and the following year was transferred to Mankato, Minn. About this time the Byllesby people purchased their first holdings in the northwest and Mr. Brewer was again transferred, this time to Everett, Wash. After a few months at Everett, he took over the management of the Sandpoint, Idaho, division of Mountain States Power Co. and remained there until appointed manager of the Byllesby company's Richmond, Calif., holdings. This was in 1912, and he remained in Richmond until January, 1919, when he was appointed vice president and general manager of Mountain States Power Co., with headquarters at Albany, Oregon, where he has since resided.

U. of O. Summer Session

Important courses for social workers will be offered by the Portland School of Social work of the University of Oregon during the summer session at Portland, June 22 to July 31.

A marine biological station, the first in Oregon, will be established by the University of Oregon at Sunset Bay, three miles south of the entrance to Coos Bay on the coast, as a part of the summer session. Plans have been completed for courses at Sunset Bay in elementary, advanced, and graduate marine zoology under the guidance of Dr. Harry B. Yocum, assistant professor of zoology.
