State Market Agent Spence believes there is a great future for the of Commerce in the state. flax-growing industry in Oregon, and that Governor Pierce perhaps builded better than he knew when he undertook to practically demonstrate it in the penitentiary. But he does not think the farmers should become over-enthused and overdo flax production until the markets for same are assured. "Flax mills are coming," says Mr. Spence, "and flax growing will no doubt develop into a big industry, but the farmers should not rush in ahead of demand. It is far safer to follow it."
