Two Scioites Honored

Hazel Philippi of Scio, newly elected editor of the O A C Co-ed Barometer, has announced her staff members for the publication. Miss Philippi has charge of all the regular departments of the paper and a special women's department. The Co-ed Barometer is a tradition of the college, being published every Junior week-end. Miss Philippi is a senior in commerce and a member of Beta Kappa sorority.

Kenneth D. Hiron of Scio is a member of the graduating class at O A C, the largest in the history of the institution. The number of candidates for graduation is conservatively estimated at 530. Mr. Hiron is a candidate for the degree of pharmaceutical chemist, given on completion of a three-year course in pharmacy.

The record class up to this time was that of 1922, the big war group numbering 522. Last year 422 were graduated. The only possible explanation for so many seniors this year is that a larger per cent of those entering college is remaining to finish, believes E. B. Lemon, registrar.

Seven students are candidates for the master of science degree, 12 for the degree of pharmaceutical chemist, and some 520 for the regular bachelor of science degree.

Mr. Hiron, son of Prof. Asa P. Hiron, is a graduate of the Scio high school. He is earning half of his college expenses and is a member of the Psi Chi fraternity. He also holds a corporal's rank in the reserve officers training corps at the college. While a student at the Scio high school, Mr. Hiron was student body president and senior class president.

Corn Is Being Planted
