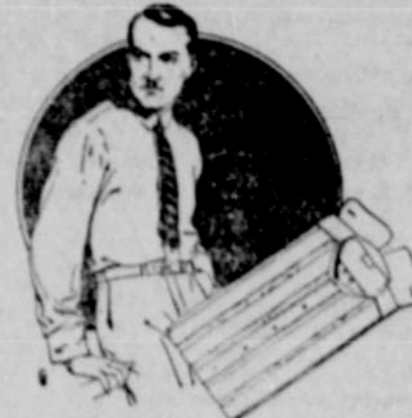
1926 Auto Licenses Ordered

Secretary of State Sam A. Kozar has placed the order for the 1926 automobile license plates. They will black with white figures; will be of the same style and size as in former years; and will be made by the Irwin Hodson, company of Portland at a cost of \$1.297 per pair, which is about one cent per pair cheaper than this year.

The cost act calls for 200,000 pairs of plaques for passenger cars, 17,000 for trucks, 2700 pairs for motorcycles, and 15,000 chauffeur badges.
