Must Grade and Candle Eggs

According to a new law that went into effect May 28, all eggs sold by stores must be candied and graded and marked in one-third inch letters on the container the true grade and quality. There are three divisions. The standard eggs must weigh not less than 1 1/2 ounces; the medium, not less than 1 7-12 ounces, and all that weigh less than that fall under the undersized eggs; each size must be packed separately and plainly marked. Eggs from a foreign country must be left in the original container and display cards denoting the fact that they are from a foreign country must be in plain view of the customer.

It will be well for groceries, restaurants and hotels to get a copy of this law—it might save a lot of embarrassment.
