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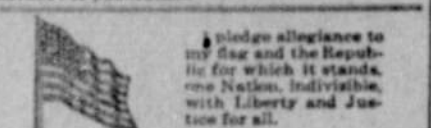

SCHOOL LAW KILLED

The right of the parent to select the school for the purpose of educating his child is upheld by the United States supreme court, in its declaring the Oregon school law unconstitutional. The case was appealed by the state from a like decision by the district court in Portland a few months ago, and which has just been sustained. The court reaffirms that parents have control of their children and that it is not a part of the state's function to so assume. If we want to make the public school supplant private and parochial schools, the proper way is to make them so good in equipment, in learning and discipline that there will be no other demand. This can be accomplished only by seeing the need and providing it.

INCREASED RATES LOWERS SERVICE

Since June 1 the mail service in Scio has been rotten, and it is not the fault of Postmaster Sticha—he is powerless to remedy the service the postoffice department is giving the people of this community.

Like a bolt of lightning from a clear sky word was received here last week that only mail outside of Linn county would be forwarded once a day—mornings—and the afternoon train would carry no papers. This leaves Scio without an afternoon paper.

Why this raw deal? On April 15 increased postal rates went into effect to care for deficits and grant greater service, and in less than two months the service is cut in two. To be sure, Scio is not a large city, but the mail received and forwarded each day would do credit to a town much larger.

Then why this rotten deal? The morning mail is heavy, and the afternoon mail light. How does the department figure it is helping the rural districts by curtailing mail service? Is the move made to force people into congested areas, or in the interest of radio companies? The idea of government is to serve the people, and just now in this section there are several thousand people without adequate mail service.

Why, Mr. Postmaster General? Crabtree, Lebanon and Shelburn are receiving the same rotten service, and like Scio, are entitled to better treatment. From Scio, the only mail that can be sent out in the afternoon is to Crabtree, Lebanon and Albany.

This is rotten service. Why?

THIS SOUNDS GOOD

We live in a land that produces more and wastes more than any other nation in the world, and yet the federal reserve bank of the U.S. has just issued a report showing that we also save more. On April 1 last 893 savings banks in various parts of the country reported an increase in savings of \$500,390,000 over a year ago. Depositors in these banks saved \$47,000,000 in the April just passed than they saved in April, 1924. These banks are not all in large cities. Some are in towns no larger than Scio, and the same thing that prevails with them will hold good with the other banking and savings institutions of the nation.
