Pole Breaks With Lineman

While doing some repair work on the Scio-Jordan line of the Mountain States Power Co. last Thursday afternoon about 4 o'clock, I. C. Russell, an employe, had the misfortune to have the pole he was working on break and throw him to the ground. This was near the Ed Fleming home, and he immediately called Dr. Prill, who went to the assistance of the injured.

At first it was thought the spine was injured and he was hurried to an Albany hospital, where an X-ray showed nothing serious beyond a severe shaking up, and the patient is getting along nicely. While on her way to the hospital to see her husband that evening, Mrs. Russell was also injured by the car in which she was riding being run into by a Corvallis car just as she was coming up on the pavement near her home in North Albany. The owner of the car in which she was riding, Peter Zehr, was also injured, and an occupant of the other car suffered a broken nose. All parties are said to be getting along nicely.

The cars were both quite badly damaged by the impact.

The city council met in regular session last Thursday night, with all members present.

The council ordered the three water meters installed which was recently purchased, one at the barber shop, one at Bartu's garage and the other at the Scio Garage.

The question of assistance to Mr. Meridian to stop Thomas creek from taking more of his property came up for discussion, and finally resulted in the council deciding to view the property in a body.

An order was made directing the fire chief to notify the owners of the old lumber and rubbish on the lots in the fire zone on Main street to have same removed in 10 days, and the same order applied to the old building still standing but badly burned.

The ordinance committee was instructed to have a sidewalk ordinance drawn giving the city the right to make repairs or build new walks when property owners refused so to do and make a lien on the property collectable with taxes.

Believing it was proper for the city to keep up the road sign at Jefferson, the council appropriated \$25 to have the sign repainted.
