KEEP CLIMBING

Watch an aeroplane some day as it soars and climbs toward the zenith accompanied by the roar of its powerful motor. Smaller and smaller it grows. Fainter and fainter becomes the hum of the motor. Higher and higher the pilot climbs. Then silence. The motor is stopped. Sailing gracefully as a hawk the machine seems to remain in the heights for a time. How beautifully she banks the curves. QUITE RIGHT

C. R. Richards, county agricultural agent of Coos county, announced in an address reported by Marshfield News that "county agents were no longer organizing farmers to buy wholesale cooperatively" but "were cooperating with merchants to stimulate agricultural development."

Commenting on the above, the Oregon Voter says: "Cooperative buying is entirely legitimate, but the losses usually exceed the savings, and it was a waste of time for a tax-paid official to devote his energy to fostering an effort which could mean so little to the farmers compared with the convenience of having local stores carry stocks of goods and extend credit. The local merchant means more to a neighborhood than any profit he can gain from the business. It would be more helpful for the county agent to foster the buy-at-home spirit, in order to help build up the local merchant as a neighborhood convenience, than to foster a practice the logical result of which is to deprive the neighborhood of the stocks of goods, the taxable values and the credit convenience of the merchant. It speaks well for the good sense of O A C in calling the county agents away from an effort that injures the rural neighborhood by depriving it of one of its principal assets, the local store."

Quite right, Mr. Chapman. The county agents and others have been pumping the well dry, and today the cash goes away from the local stores to mail order houses and in wholesale buying as long as the citizen has it, and the home merchant has the "pleasure" of extending the credit to suit the customer's own convenience. But the change as announced will bring about a better understanding between merchant and customer, we hope.
