Verle Hay Buried at Silverton

Last week we carried a short notice of the accidental death of Verle Hay, nephew of H. O. Shilling, at Silverton, but did not have any authentic information. From the Silverton papers we learn that the young man was employed by the Silver Falls Lumber Co. at camp 11 as fire tender on a donkey engine, and while laughing and joking with other workmen, unknowingly backed under a falling log and his life was instantly snuffed out. He was one of triplets born to Mr. and Mrs. James Hay, and would have been 17 years old today.

At the time the news was given to us last week it was thought the burial would take place at the Miller cemetery, but his remains were laid to rest in the Silverton cemetery on Friday, Rev. J. A. Bennett, pastor of the Christian church, officiating. The family is well known here and our people extend their heartfelt sympathy in the untimely taking of so young a life.
