IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You, and each of you, are hereby summoned and required to appear and answer the complaint of the plaintiffs above named in the above entitled Court now on file with the Clerk of said Court on or before the last day of the time prescribed in the order for the publication of this summons, which day for appearance and answer is the 6th day of August, 1925; and you, and each of you, are hereby notified that if you fail so to appear and answer said complaint for want thereof the plaintiffs will apply to the above entitled Court for the relief demanded in said complaint, namely:

For a decree that the plaintiffs, Joe Holub, Josephine Snidl, Anton Holub and Emma Holub and the defendants, Agnes Dotson, Frank Holub and Emil Holub are the owners in fee of the following described real property, to-wit:

Beginning in the center of a County road 57.50 chains North of the Southwest corner of Section 17 in Township 10 South of Range 1 West of the Willamette Meridian, Oregon, running thence North 85 degrees East along the center of said road a distance of 6.52 chains; thence South 194 feet; thence North 85 degrees East 542 feet; thence South 38.52 chains; thence West 16.05 chains to the Western boundary line of said Section 17; thence North along the Western boundary line of said Section 17 to the place of beginning, containing 63.15 acres, more or less, situated in Linn County, State of Oregon.

BIRTHDAY TODAY

Today is No. 52, volume 28, of the Scio Tribune, although the paper was established under name of The Santiam News in August, 1897, after T. L. Dugger had transferred the ownership into other hands.

For 36 years Scio has had a newspaper, The Scio Press being established in May, 1889, by Coll. Van Cleave, who conducted it about a year, turning the paper over to his son, Bert VanCleave, and went to Toledo, Oregon, where he established the Yaquina Post in May, 1890.

In the advertising columns of the Scio Press of May 24, 1890, we notice the following Scio merchants: Scio Roller Mills; Thomas & Bilyeu, livermen; Dr. E. O. Hyde; Drs. J. W. and M. T. Cole; Smith & Stanley, millinery; L. Maver, grocer; S. M. Townsend, grocer, boots, shoes, etc.; S. M. Daniels, grocer, boots, shoes, etc.; Gill & Logan, blacksmith and wagonmakers; Molby & Carev, harness and saddlery; D. Morris, the druggist; Devaney & Shelton, dress goods and clothing; the Scio Bakery; Will M. Abbott, furniture and bedding; also 16 homestead entry legals. Then as now, L. E. Blain used the Scio paper to advertise his uptodate clothing store in Albany.

That the paper has survived many hard bumps in order to live proves that newspapermen are born, not made. The paper was good in those days, for the news was readily handed in to the editor. Succeeding editors have attempted to hold the standard, and some have made progress toward bettering it. The present owners are trying to keep the paper the best in its class, and hope we are succeeding. Then as now, all business houses in Scio did not see the wisdom of advertising their wares in the home paper, thus wondering why business goes elsewhere.
