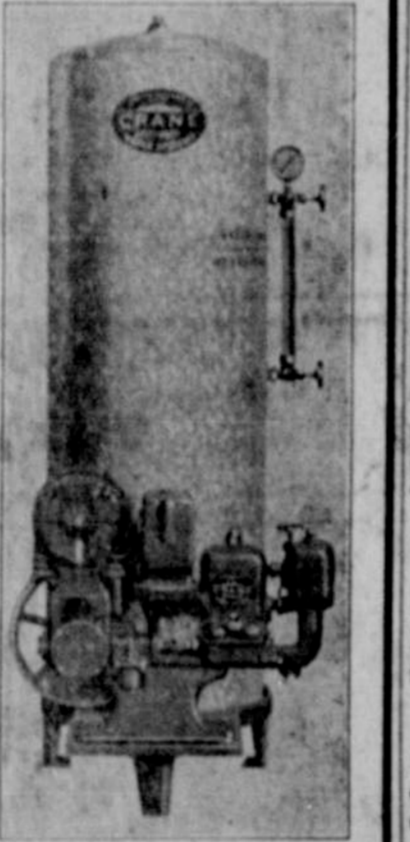

Alive to Interests

The Santiam Fish and Game Propagation and Protective Association held a meeting the other night at Albany to make recommendations to the State Game Commission with the hope that some or all them might be accepted and put into practice. The first was that the residence for superintendent at the Roaring River Hatchery be immediately completed, as the foundation has long been ready and lumber is on the ground; the second was that more wardens be placed in the field at the time young pheasants and quail are beginning to fly in order to protect them from would-be sportsmen who kill them off out of season; another was the matter of needed protection against willful slaughter of deer in the Alsea mountains. These are pertinent and shows the association is alive to what is going on. The association expressed confidence in the State Game Commission and pledged its support in upholding the laws. Let no Scio sportsman bring disgrace on his name or his sportsmanship by killing game out of season or bagging more than the limit.

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
