When first seen the barn was enveloped in flames and was spreading across the road to Chas. McClain's stubble field and toward his buildings. The neighbors were called by phone and all rushed to the scene of the fire and by heroic work soon had it under control.

Mrs. Hirons' place is unoccupied at present and the barn contained nothing but some old straw, so the loss there is small, but had it reached Mr. McClain's buildings it would have been quite heavy, as he had his barns filled with grain.

The origin of the fire is unknown, but it is thought it was from a match, a cigarette or cigar stub thrown in the dry grass by some one driving along the road.

## Target Practice Is Serious

Sunday afternoon while Otto Limbeck, aged about 27, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Limbeck, of the Mt. Pleasant neighborhood, was visiting at the home of Lyle Chrisman, the men engaged in target practice with a shot gun, using the barn door on the Chrisman farm as the target, and in some manner while in the hands of Lyle, the gun was accidentally discharged and Otto was shot in the face, neck and shoulder. He also received a cracked skull and the loss of some teeth. Dr. Prill was called and he took him to a hospital in Albany, where on Monday sixteen shots were removed from the head of the injured man and seven from the left shoulder. An X-ray examination revealed the fact that no shots are in vital organs.

No blame is attached, as the men are the best of friends, and witnesses say the shooting was purely accidental. Aside from Otto's suffering, Lyle feels as badly about the accident as does Otto. It is said Otto's condition is good and recovery will be rapid, unless something unforeseen happens.
