Friends of Jay H. Upton of Bend are urging his candidacy for governor on the republican ticket. No man in all Oregon is better qualified to hold down that exalted position than Jay H. Upton, as he thoroughly understands the state's needs. Come on in, Jay, give your friends a chance to work for you.

Charles A. Howard, superintendent of schools at Marshfield, has announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for state superintendent of public instruction to succeed J. A. After attending the ball game in Albany last Sunday, and watching the outbursts of the manager of the Albany team, we now know why the Democrat-Herald can only see 'row' when another amateur team plays there. Since there is no likelihood of a sawmill here of any proportions in the next quarter of a century, why not the small fruit and vegetable growers get together and put in a cannery? In other communities this is a paying industry and could be made so here. Probably a woolen mill would pay if tried. A good way to prove that industries will thrive here and make payrolls is to wholeheartedly patronize what we already have. Other industries come into a community when its people support what is already there. When we can do this we will see our community grow, will see better schools and churches, better homes, better business firms and better banks.
