TRUTHS TERSELY TOLD

One good way for a merchant to create interest in buying at home is for him to buy everything at home that he can. When we practice our preachments results will follow to the mutual good.

Senator Bob Stanfield was arrested at Baker the other day for being drunk and disorderly in a cafe, according to a dispatch. A misfit in office and a disgrace to the state that has honored him. And he wants reelection.

To one looking on from a long distance, the findings of the jury in the case of the state vs. Nye and Edwards, charged with moonshining and bootlegging, when Edwards was found not guilty and Nye was found guilty, it surely looks like justice miscarried. Either both were innocent or both were guilty, for they were partners and sanctioned each other's doings, if the printed evidence was correct. More reason to believe the jury system is wrong.

It is a shame and disgrace to the manhood of this community when a minister of the gospel comes to our town and delivers a foul lecture, as was done last Thursday night in the presence of boys under 16 years of age. No one can measure the harm that may come when a man who is supposed to be a moral example to the young and old forgets himself and utters language that even the most degraded would not use in a public place. If his language here was a sample of his language in the pulpit, we do not wonder at his resignation from the ministry, as he announced.

Speaking of taxes! What's the use, anyway? No one has a patent on how to reduce them, and if they are reduced in one place they go up in two more. Instead of spending eight hours a day cursing our high taxes, we should use six of them in productive labor, thus reducing our taxes by increasing our earning power. There is enough time wasted by each one every year to more than pay our individual taxes. And if we could learn to do team work in our communities, another source to reduce taxes would be found—the greater the population, the less tax each individual pays. Therefore team work is a dividend payer.

Crime has become so rampant one does not feel like being neighborly; in fact, he dare not be. Bring a "friend" into your home, and he steals your wife. Ask a pedestrian to ride with you, and he hits you over the head and robs you. Have

a car for hire, and you get a customer who kills you and steals the car. Let your little children play in the front yard, they are kidnaped and murdered. Start across the street, and some daredevil will try to run you down. There are hundreds of other crimes that also prevent us from being neighborly, and how we are to right this crime wave is yet to be solved. Some have argued that confidence and neighborliness will do it, but it seems these are taken advantage of and death and destruction follow.

While people were depressed over the mishap of the Shenandoah and the loss of lives, came the news that flyers to Hawaii who were thought lost had been found and all well. On top of this came a sweeping charge of incompetency and criminal negligence by the high officials of the army and navy by Col. Mitchell. He may be right and he may be wrong, and if his investigators are unbiased, the people will know the truth. Something is wrong somewhere.

Ever since equal suffrage came to women and they have been earning approximately men's wages, the divorce evil has been steadily increasing, likewise juvenile delinquencies. Three-fourths of the crimes today are committed by those under 25 years of age, which shows that the street has been the tutor while the mother exercised her independence and went out to take the work that belonged to some man so he could support his family. Family quarrels are started and the children hear it and lose all respect for both parents, and sooner or later the police pick Johnnie or Mary up for stealing or other crimes. The widow of necessity must have work to support herself and children, if she has any, but the woman who has a husband and children only courts and brings on a divided home when she goes out to work. The husband may be a brute, and a woman is better off without him, but in 90 per cent of the cases a woman fares better if she does her housework and keeps a motherly eye on the children. In the beginning it was never intended that woman should be the breadwinner, nor was it intended that she should be man's slave, her function being that of ministering angel to her family. When men can earn the living at a wage he should receive, mothers and daughters will cease being flippers and home life will be happy and safe.
