## Schwindt Died Sunday

After battling for life for eleven days against great odds, with a bullet in his brain, Joe Schwindt died Sunday morning at 9:15. It came as the climax to a family quarrel, in which his 15 year old son must answer to a charge of murder.

The remains of the deceased were taken to Kingston Tuesday, where they were interred. He is survived by his wife and twelve children.

On Wednesday morning, Nov. 4, about 6:30, Johnnie Schwindt was witnessing a violent quarrel, it is said, between his dead father and his brother, Joe, jr., in which the father had the best of it and had threatened to break his legs and arms. To protect his brother, it is said Johnnie secured a gun and shot his father, who died as above stated.

Johnnie was immediately arrested and has been in jail ever since. He will be arraigned before County Judge Payne this morning, because of his age, and from there transferred to the justice court, where he will be bound over to the grand jury with or without bail.

## T. J. Butler Dies

T. J. Butler, 77, of Albany died Saturday following an operation of a few days before. He was one of the best known and best loved men in Linn county, having served the people as county commissioner for 18 years.

He married Frances C. Holt, sister of the Holt boys near Gilkey, at Jefferson, on Feb. 20, 1877, who, with two children and three grandchildren, survive. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon from the Methodist church in Albany and interment took place in the Masonic cemetery.
