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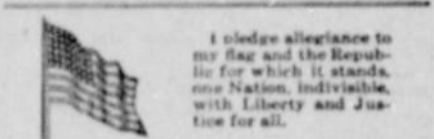

WHO IS RESPONSIBLE?

Tyranny breeds trouble, and often bloodshed. Individuals and nations will endure the disease so long and then the inevitable happens. Parents are rulers, set upon a throne of love or hate. Children are the subjects, and they love or hate, according to how the rulers lord it over them. Every child should be taught to obey, but not through force; the word of a parent to its child should be true, with no promise unbroken, if a child is to honor the parent; the word of a child should never be disputed until it is found to be untrue.

When a child loses its confidence in father and mother, then the police and the courts are burdened

with their misdemeanors. Parents can stop juvenile delinquencies if they will take stock of themselves. Love and truth will bring about the good results. Tyranny or abuse brings disaster. Children, as well as adults, can be led but not driven. When we realize our responsibilities and obey them, the crime wave will begin to recede.

INSURING AMERICA'S AIR STRENGTH.

President Coolidge's newly appointed commission to investigate government aviation has a chance to perform a service for the country that will leave its effects for generations.

The people of this country want the army and navy aviation services kept up with those of other nations. Colonel Billy Mitchell says they are not, now.

And he is correct in this.

Personalities, jealousies and red tape bickerings will not solve America's air problem. The commission, unless it cuts through all the officials and unofficial nonsense that it will encounter, had best never been appointed.

The likelihood, however, is that it will function as the president intended.

Certainly it should never lose sight of the fact that it has great responsibility—that of assuring America's air strength adequate for years to come. The air service is on trial before the commission; the commission is on trial before the American people, whose experience with air matters has been both bitter and costly, and who are in no mood to brook further nonsense in a matter so vital to national defense.

UNFAIR COMPETITION

For a good many years the government has been furnishing printed and stamped envelopes to large and small users at almost the cost of the stamp. In fact, the printed envelope, to say nothing of the stamp, is furnished cheaper than the printers of the country can buy them wholesale in blank stock. This is unfair competition against business houses who must pay city, county, state and government tax.

"Isn't that alright?" you ask.

To banks, big business concerns, and to soliciting postmasters whose salaries are increased according to the gross receipts, we answer, Yes. But from a taxpaying standpoint we answer, No. To illustrate: When the government operated the railroads during the war and for a time thereafter, it was charged and also proved that the government was operating them at a loss and that the deficit had to be made up by taxation. Not many of us approved that system and urged the return of the railroads to their owners. We are still guaranteeing 6 per cent to the railroads.

As everyone knows, even congress and the postmaster-general, the postal department shows a huge deficit each year, and a large part of that deficit is occasioned by the government selling printed stamped envelopes at a loss. It is good business for the purchaser, but mighty poor business to the government and taxpayers.

Politics and business are not good partners. The former only knows how to spend the money and pile on the tax. The latter must and does figure on how to make ends meet and earn wages. The former comes easy while the latter often sweats blood. We hope congress will see the injustice of government competition with private business and thus eliminate the government from any further inroads. Sell stamps, postal cards and money orders, but leave out the costly business of competing with private enterprises.

Another experiment that congress

should call a halt on is the arial mail service. This costs untold money and is another instance of the taxpayers footing the bill and the politician gloats over his achievement of sending a letter for 25c that costs the government probably \$25.

Business is good in the postal department for the employes but not for the taxpayer. Why should the common people pay for the envelopes of the big users? Please answer us Senators McNary and Stanfield and Congressman Hawley.
