Matt Doubek, 62, who had been a resident of Scio for 16 years, died at his home Sunday morning after an illness of several months and which had kept him bedfast for two months. An abdominal inflammation was the cause of his death.

Mr. Doubek was born in Hungary, Austria, but came to the United States when he was 21 years old. He came from Hoquiam, Wn., where the family lived for some time, to Scio. Mr. Doubek was a hard worker and thrifty, and had one of the most profitable 10-acre prune orchards in the valley.

Besides his widow, the deceased is survived by four daughters, two living in Portland, one in Vancouver, B. C., and the fourth in Hoquiam, Wn. The funeral was to have been held Tuesday, but on account of the inability of the daughter to arrive from Vancouver in time it was postponed until 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, which took place at the Z C B J hall. The services were conducted in Bohemian by J. F. Patry and in English by F. B. Studnicka. Immediately after the services the body was taken to Portland for cremation, accompanied by the widow and one daughter.

## CROWN MINE STILL TOPIC OF INTEREST

Two Shifts, Day and Night, to Start This Week—Plan Mill Early in Spring

Five of the stockholders in the Crown Mine—Joe Boyanovsky, G. M. Bilyeu, Fred Mumper, Charley Beard, J. F. Wesely—accompanied R. E. Peery to the mine Saturday to look things over, and returned Sunday fuller of enthusiasm than a dog is covered with fleas. These men say the half has not been told, and can't be told, for the property is getting richer every day.

Beginning today, and not later than tomorrow, a day and night shift will be worked, as enough men was taken up yesterday to make it possible. Floyd Shelton has been employed as cook for the men, and enough supplies, including powder, to last two or three months, is also on hand at the mine. This, and the fact that there is no outstanding indebtedness against the company, is more reason for enthusiasm.

All ore that has been recently assayed, shows a value of \$2.50 to \$80 per ton, and this ore is now on the dump ready for the concentrator, and probably enough is there to make material payment on mill. It is the plan of the company to have the mill in place by next April ready for operation. Enough money is on hand now to go through the winter, taken up by the present stockholders. When the mill is placed a recapitalization of the company will occur.

Every stockholder is holding fast, and some who have had nothing but unkind words would now like to be a stockholder, it is said.

The mine is located about 40 miles east of Scio, and is at our door.
