## INSANE MAN CAUSES CONSIDERABLE STIR

Praying on Knees in Middle of Road and Other Actions Takes Him to Hospital

Felix Stevens, hatless, coatless and wet, was picked up Friday evening in Scio while asking alms of citizens on the streets. About 20 minutes before Walter Ross and another boy reported seeing a man in the road about half a mile east of town on his knees praying and they had to stop to keep from running over him. The man gave them some religious admonition and started to zigzagging across the road.

The boys came on and stopped at Gilbert McDonald's to notify them of the strange man and his actions. Mr. McDonald and his wife were in town attending a meeting and their children were alone, and the notice had hardly been given to them when the door opened and the stranger stood there with his finger pointed at them, and again he uttered a religious admonition. Vincent, the eldest boy, called up his uncle, Archie Lindley, told him what had happened, and he immediately went after them and took them to his home, where they staid all night. Vincent was thoughtful enough to leave a note telling his parents what had taken place, where they had gone and asking them not to worry.

As soon as Mr. McDonald heard of the strange man and his actions, he and Rolla Shelton, Constable J. N. Weddle and City Marshal Hoagland, went to the McDonald home and found the note. Nothing had been disturbed. Somehow they missed the man on the way out but found him asking for money to pay for a bed when they got back to town.

Constable Weddle took him over to the hotel and put him to bed for the night. Saturday morning the constable took the man to Albany, where it was learned that his name is Felix Stevens, that he was overseas during the war and was gassed, and that he had escaped from the state hospital at Steilacomb, Wash., early in November. The unfortunate man is said to be harmless, his hallucination being religion. His parents live in the Palouse country, he said.
