## ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY

### Former Linn Man Enters Race for School Superintendent

E. F. Carlton of Eugene, former Linn resident, Tuesday announced his candidacy, subject to the approval of the voters of the republican party at the coming primary election, for the office of superintendent of public instruction.

Mr. Carlton submits his candidacy and will make his campaign on the ground that he is fitted by both training and experience for the position. For 13 years he was assistant superintendent of public instruction, and for two years was field representative of the University of Oregon. Through these positions he has become familiar with the school problems of every section of the state.

His early youth was spent in Linn county, and after completing all the work then offered in the public schools, he secured his first academic training at the Santiam Academy, Lebanon. Later he attended U of O and Pacific University, the latter giving him the A. B. degree. Since this degree was conferred upon him he has taken post graduate work at the U of O.

His experience as instructor includes work in the rural schools of Oregon as teacher, and as principal and superintendent of schools at Joseph, Albany and Eugene, in addition to serving three years as instructor at the Lincoln High School in Portland.

Mr. Carlton is a member of the First Congregational church at Eugene.
