

Parcel Post is Extended

An important change in the regulations relating to parcel post matter was announced by Postmaster Myers yesterday.

The change makes it possible to mail books, old newspapers, magazines and everything classed as "miscellaneous reading matter," in packages of more than four pounds

and up to 50 pounds, at parcel post rates.

On pieces of miscellaneous reading matter weighing four pounds or less, the rate remains as at present, 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction, regardless of distance carried.

After March 16, all parcels of miscellaneous printed matter weighing more than eight ounces may go at parcel post rates.
