Eastern dispatches state that a terricylone swept through Missouri, Kansas and Texas. In Vernon county, Mo., thirty houses were destroyed and fifteen persons killed. The wind was preceded by a hail storm, which done considerable damage. Many of the hailstones weighed from three to four ounces, and some of them measured nine inches in circumference. They crashed through roofs, dwellings and barns, leaving holes through which a man's arm would pass with ease. The town of Prescott, Kansas, was literally wiped out of existence, not a single building being left standing to mark the site where once was a prosperous and thriving place. So far as learned fifteen live were lost at that place. 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
