OF INTEREST TO FARMERS.

This is the time of year when every spare hour should be devoted to preparing sheds for winter.

Sheep will eat nearly all kinds of weeds, and may be made to do good service in some fields.

When there is no general farm work you can always busy yourself repairing and harnessing machinery or fixing sheds and stables.

Every farmer who is handy with tools should have a shop and enough tools to repair the woodwork of his farm machinery.

Do not let the blackberry and raspberry canes grow up in grass, but cultivate them thoroughly, so as to secure greater growth and stronger canes.

The United States Dairyman does not believe that sweet cream from a given quantity of milk, will yield as much butter as sour cream from the same milk.

Sheep will eat more, be more contented, and thrive better on a new than on an old range. Frequent change of range for them is important at this season of the year.

An old and experienced nurseryman tells an exchange that trees grafted in this month, will heal over quickly during their full growth.

The plow will do better service killing weeds, if they be of heavy growth, than will the cultivator.

Too much can hardly be said in praise of onions for fowls. They are a preventive and remedy for many of the diseases to which domestic fowls are liable.

When there is a rat hole through plastering or between the stones of the cellar wall, the most effectual way to stop it is to fill it with plaster of paris, mixed with broken glass.

It has been observed that potatoes which are most subject to rot grow near the surface, while those like the White Star, Burbank and St. Patrick which are less so, grow deeper in the soil.

The Rural New York thinks there is seldom, if ever, any necessity for feeding red pepper or other condiments to fowls when they are properly fed on a variety of food.

Lima beans are grown on nearly every farm for market and for home consumption. A more profitable crop or a more profitable dish cannot be grown than green Limas.

When grass seed is sown in the fall it should be done early enough, so that the germ will take root sufficiently to prevent its being frozen out during the winter.

Many farmers believe that potatoes should be dug as soon as the tops are dead; potatoes are certainly not improved by lying in the ground during the fall rains—but when they commence rotting it is better to let them remain in the ground than to dig them and have them decay in the cellar.
