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THAT NEW SCHOOL HOUSE.

We have no complaint to make at either of our schools, the academy or our public school, and we believe that they are both managed by competent teachers, and are both doing a good work. The first question to settle in regard to our public school building, is, does it meet the demands? No one familiar with school work or who is acquainted with the needs of the same, would stultify themselves by claiming that the building is either commodious enough or constructed well for a first-class public school, just such a school as Lebanon needs, and as she must have, to either meet the claims of her present population or to attract others to settle among us. Now the property owners have to pay the school tax whether their children go or not, and if there is not room enough inside they will have to stay outside, but pay their money all the same. What we want is the worth of our money, by the children being advanced by the most thorough and rapid manner without the squandering of needless time. We need at least eight grades, and no one teacher should have more than three; in fact, two grades are enough for any one teacher, and no teacher can do themselves or their pupils justice with sixty or more students and with four grades. We must have a building with more rooms, of modern construction and conveniences if we would meet the demands of an appreciative public. Farmers, stockmen and immigrants are seeking and will have the very best advantages for their children, and if Lebanon will not accommodate them they will go somewhere else. It will not do for tax payers to down this question; it is like Bancho's ghost, it will not down. The question is to how the money is to be raised is the one that most concerns us, but we think that when the matter is thoroughly conversed that there is wisdom enough in our town to solve that.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

We had the pleasure on last Sunday of meeting in Brownsville the genial face of Hon. J. B. R. Morelock. He had just returned from Eugene City as a member of the Committee on Education at that city. The committee will doubtless recommend an increase of appropriation and some additional teaching force to the school. The state honors itself by an open hand of liberality to this noble institution. If Oregon would have her own sons and daughters qualified to fill positions of emolument and renown she must provide for them the very best and most ample facilities.

Now that Mr. Bayard has washed his hands of the German difficulty, Congress appears equally slow in taking action. The Republican members of the Senate Foreign Affairs Committee are indisposed to make rapid progress, as they do not know what policy the next administration will follow. Probable it is that Mr. Harrison will receive the question as a legacy from this administration. By that time it is to be supposed that the affair may have been settled by the prompt action of England. Neither Germany nor the United States could afford to give battle. Germany has her hands full with her watchful European enemies, and this country has no navy with which to make war.

Whether or not, as Mr. Bayard's friends allege, Mr. Cleveland has treated him "merely as a clerk," he is responsible for his own political death. From the fisheries treaty to the Mexico trouble the State Department has exhibited very little but its weakness from the Kelly imbroglio to the sackville folly Mr. Bayard's administration has been singularly unfortunate. In voiding vital issues it has become the rival of Dickens' "circumlocution office." Nor can the blame for this condition of affairs be shifted to the President's shoulders.
