Our naturalization laws should be
 amended as to make the inquiry into the
 character and good disposition of persons
 applying for citizenship more careful and
 searching. Our existing laws have been
 in their administration unimpressive and
 often unintelligible in form. The priv-
 leges of American citizenship are so great
 and its duties so grave, that we may well
 insist upon a good knowledge of every
 person applying for citizenship, and a
 good knowledge by him of our institu-
 tions. There are men of all races, even
 the best, whose coming is necessarily a
 burden upon our public revenues or a
 threat to social order. These should be
 identified and excluded.
