LOWER SODA.

Lower Soda, in many respects, is well adapted to satisfy the curiosity of the curious, the wants of pleasure seekers, and the health of the invalid. Situated on the south bank of the south fork of the South Santian 32 miles southeast of Lebanon, it is easily of access, and with a good team may be reached in a day from Lebanon. The county road runs within one mile of these celebrated springs, and then stops just in time for the free American citizen to pay one dollar to travel one mile over one of the grandest land grabber's monopolies of the western coast. The government gave enough of land to build this road and keep it up too, without taking from the citizens of Oregon two dollars a vehicle to cross over the mountains. We have no objections to the contractors or their assigns getting all the land the government promised them, if they liberally and truly fulfilled their part of the contract—but then that is the question. The accommodations at Lower Soda are good—nice camping grounds, well fenced, with good sheds to sleep under and plenty of soda water, all free. Pasture for horses or hay either can be had of Mr. Westfall at very reasonable charges, who is doing all he can in a kind and genial way to entertain visitors.
