During the past year a new spring has been discovered, situated on the north side of the river, and having a remarkable strong volume of medicated water. being considered superior to the other and better known spring of the south side. For those who prefer to board good accommodations at reasonable prices can be had at the hotel under the management of the present lesses Mr. Westfall, who also has pasturage or stable room for all stock. During the past month the travel to this resort has been very large, and at the present there are a great many campers from all parts of the state.


