

THE FIRST STEP TAKEN.

The initiatory step has been taken in the march of progress that is to lead on to the future building up of more than one industry at this place.

The incorporation of the Wirtsburg and Lebanon Flume Company leads directly to the building up of paying manufacturing industries at both places. It also brings Lebanon prominently into the field of competition for such enterprises with other points, as it will furnish as ample water-power as is desired, in a shape to admit of its being used many times over in its passage through the city, thus multiplying the facilities many fold. Other conditions necessary for success are not lacking even now. The location is naturally favorable and is, also, capable of large artificial improvement in various ways. Raw material is plenty and easily and cheaply procurable, for many kinds of production that would yield a fair return for the capital invested. Shipping facilities are good, and were there a demand for it, would be largely improved. Realty is not so high priced here as at many other points, and a sufficient amount of land for any factory grounds could be obtained for a nominal sum. There cannot be a place found in the country where the smaller manufactories could be started so cheaply as at Lebanon, or where there would be so sure a promise of growth and prosperity for them. Paper mills would find the materials for their use in the greatest profusion here, and obtainable at the lowest figures. This is only one industry that we will mention, but it is an index for a dozen others that can be started here, and, pushed with energy, would prove largely profitable.

The initial movement made by the Flume Company should not be allowed to stop for any cause, and we do not think it will. The company is composed of energetic and far-seeing men who have demonstrated the fact that they can see their own interest in an enterprise that is destined to do more for this place than anything that has gone before it for many years. We are glad to be able to chronicle the organization of this company at this time, and hope to see them succeed beyond their expectations, believing that every such enterprise that tends for the public weal, as well as the private success; that helps to build a city or turn a wheel in the furthering of enterprises which furnish employment for labor is worthy of the best wishes and hearty support of every progressive citizen. We hope to see steps taken at an early date, which will bear good fruit in the establishment of some industry here that will give steady employment to many hands, for we know that others will quickly follow, and that it will be the dawn of such an era of prosperity for Lebanon as has yet been deemed possible by but few. We hope soon to be able to tell of other steps taken in the same direction by others of our citizens who have the best interests of the place at heart. The way is open, who will make the next move?

The indications of growth and prosperity are seen on every hand. New business is talked of and new houses are springing up on every hand. The vacant houses are rapidly filling up and soon it will be a hard matter to find a house in the place for rent. There is a good prospect of another Livery Stable being started here at an early date, which added to the accommodations in that line already here, will fully meet the wants of the public for a time.

There is perhaps more stir in the residence than in the business portion of town. In the northern part of town especially, there are a great many new dwellings either in process of construction or projected and many of them are quite pretentious structures. Lebanon is now in line for the march of prosperity and with the start already made should soon be in the van. Every indication is favorable and there need now be nothing but steady growth and continued advancement. With the improvements now under way and in prospect the present season will be a very busy one here until winter sets in. Even then the activity will hardly cease as the winter months are the best in which to form plans for another season of busy labor.
