The board of delegates at San Diego have expressed confidence in Mayor Gunn's integrity.

Frank Zenisburg is under arrest at Fresno on the charge of arson committed at Bates' Station.

The loss to the raisin crop in Briggs' vineyard, near Davisville, Yolo county, is said to reach \$40,000.

Three boys and two girls of the Barron family, at Nevada City, have died of diphtheria since October 13th.

Police officials at Sacramento are openly charged with levying blackmail on women outcasts and their friends.

The proposition for a Historical Fair at Sacramento, was favorably discussed by several citizens of the capitol recently.

The Oregon and Transcontinental Railroad Company has decided to dissolve and divide the assets among the stockholders.

Commissioner Routhier says the fish ladder in the Klamath river, which had been complained of, is all that could be desired.

Considerable dissatisfaction was shown at the Merced courting match last week over the decisions of Judge Tidmarsh.

Charles Roberts, a cattleman of Albuquerque, picked a quarrel with Ralph Cribbets, an employe, and Cribbets killed him.

The stage at the Fruit-growers' Convention at Fresno was adorned with Fresno county oranges. The meeting was an interesting one.

A new Volapuk paper has just been started in Portland, Or., by Arnold Scherzinger, professor of Volapuk, entitled Volapuken Melopik.

The heaviest snowstorm in ten years has visited Northern and Central New Mexico. High winds prevailed and the snow is drifting and freezing.

Several persons in San Diego are experimenting with the cascava plant to see whether or not it will grow in this state. It does well in Florida.

Edward C. Gunther was shot twice through the body by Frank Clifford in a quarrel about Gunther's wife, at Fresno, last week, and is likely to die.

D. P. Felten, of Spadra, put in one and one-half acres to peanuts last spring as an experiment. He has sold his "goobers" in Los Angeles for \$216.

E. D. Stephens, of Sacramento, has received a telegram from New York stating that the Tokay grapes sold for him there brought at the rate of \$374 a ton net.

The board of trustees of Sacramento county are not permitted to run streets through Sutter Fort or to destroy the historic structure by the deed of John A. Sutter, Jr.

The Altura New Era publishes the names of seven men whom it charges with being "dead beats" and "slippery customers." Their indebtedness ranges from \$4 50 to \$2 50.

There is no Indian uprising in Arizona beyond the escape of the eight prisoners who killed their guard. The reported fight near Crittenden has not corroborated.

The British man-of-war Amphion has been docked at Esquimalt and she shows a jagged hole in the hull thirty feet long, the result of striking a hidden rock in the fog last week.

A fabulously rich silver vein was discovered recently in San Gabriel Canyon. Assays of ore specimens show \$12,000 per ton. The place is located about five miles back of the Azusa.

Chief of Police Mitchell, at Seattle, has published a notice warning the criminals to leave the city at once or go to work. He promises to put them in the chain gang if they disobey the order.

There is said to be \$40,000 in coin in proposition used in some quarter for the hands of the Seattle Relief Committee, and inquiries as to the disposition of the money are becoming frequent.
