A TRIP TO ASTORIA.

Last Tuesday week in company with Chas. D. Montague, we left here for Portland, where we stayed until Thursday morning and took the boat for Astoria. On inquiry we found we had been in Portland over an hour. We then strolled about the city until four o'clock when we took the train for Lebanon.
