Citizen — Fine Farming
and Grazing Lands.

LEBANON, Ore., Feb. 17, 1899.
Lebanon is situated in a land of hope of which it is the gateway. Lebanon is situated at the head of what is known as the Albany prairie, one of the finest farming prairies on the coast. In the summer season the water comes down from the mountains, the ranchman up from the plains, the teacher escapes from the school room, the carpenter blows the dust from his hat, the lumberman retires from his mill, the sound of the woodman's ax falls to echo, the pride of the village, the hero of the cabin, the inhabitant of the canyon, the sealer of the pack, the king of industries, the participant of fashions, all escape from the common demands of every day life and rush to the capital city of Lebanon for pleasure resorts and for supplies and camping outfits for a short pleasure season at the great mineral springs near Lebanon which are numerous, and thousands of people drink out of them and claim their benefits. But not so today; every man, woman and child is on the stir, although no boom, but a general awakening of dry bones. The advent of the Lebanon canal and paper mill will hasten the inevitable transformation. Their presence here is like the giving out of an enlivening and vivifying electric current what few clouds hang over Lebanon will dissolve like the fog before the face of the rising sun. Lebanon has two transportation lines, the S. P. R. R. and Albany canal, and a few years ago a heavy laden craft ploughed the waters of the Santiam river as far up as this city, but had to abandon the business, not for the lack of trade but for the want of water. As it made its return trip it was filled from the top of the

smoke stack to the steerage with pleasure seekers, most of them the fair sex, but the vessel had the misfortune to run on a sand bar and cause the would be pleasure seekers to walk back through the mud. About this time the S. P. R. R. put in an appearance, which they claim to be the best paying fourteen miles on their line. Lebanon is well represented with almost all kinds of business, has good churches and schools as you will find in any city of its size, and numbers of large stores of all kinds. Lebanon can boast of the best butcher and packing establishments in the state. We have a good class of people as you will find; we have a class of people that can suit anyone that comes along. There is a movement on already foot for a fine race track or driving course which will please the sport and lover of fast horses and all those who like to take a spin after supper and catch the fine Oregon sea breeze. There is already some attention paid to fast horses. W. J. Guy has a pacing horse that shows up well in register and speed, and is ready to pace along by the side of most anything that comes along. J. Burkhart and R. Hiatt also have a trotting horse which they think second to none in the state. The Zellinger boys will accommodate the runners most any distance. So you see Lebanon is prepared to make its everlasting escape.
