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**OREGON'S LEGISLATORS.**  
The legislature of Oregon, that has just convened at its regular biennial session, says West Shore, will be called upon to enact the most important legislation demanded of any legislature since Oregon became a state, and the people have a natural interest in knowing something about the men to whom such vital interests are entrusted. Upon examination, it appears that there are twenty-three republicans and seven democrats in the senate and forty-two republicans and eighteen democrats in the house, giving the republicans a majority of forty on a joint ballot. The significance of this is that it insures the election of a republican successor to Senator Mitchell and renders the republican party wholly responsible for the legislation of the session, since it has two-thirds majority in each house. Sequestered into groups, there are twenty-nine farmers and stock raisers, nineteen merchants, fifteen attorneys, eight manufacturers, four bankers, four physicians, two real estate dealers, two mechanics, one accountant and one school teacher. This shows a pretty fair representation of the state, and augurs well for the passage of enlightened legislation. The youngest member of the senate is Jeff Myers, of Seaside, and of the house W. E. Thomas, of Portland. The oldest member of the senate is J. C. Carson, of Portland, and of the house John Minto, of Salem. Mr. Myers and Mr. Minto are respectively the youngest and oldest in the entire body. Less than one-third of them have been members of previous legislatures, and are to that extent free from the unprogressive spirit of their predecessors. Nine only are of foreign birth, nine of the others being natives of Oregon.

The Farmers' Alliance is becoming a political factor that will make itself felt before another presidential election. An official enumeration of the membership was undertaken last July, which estimates the number belonging to the organization at 1,268,500. The Alliance is semi-secret in its workings and bears certain trades and professions from membership. The ineligible classes are bankers, merchants, brokers, commission dealers, buyers of cotton, grain and produce, lawyers, city doctors, preachers and school teachers, land and book agents, canvassers, liveymen, speculators and gamblers. Politicians of every political hue view with apprehension the giant strides of this rapidly-growing organization. Some wily politicians are true to some untoward circumstances of produce a rupture in the ranks, and thus continue the old parties in power. Editors of some of the great political dailies are hired, like the prophet Balaam, to curse the advancing host, but still the tide of enthusiasm sweeps across the country and promises to melt into one party the various elements of reform. It is very natural that those who have been denied membership should fail to see anything good in the platform of the Alliance, and consequently think it an inexcusable oversight that would exclude them from the councils of the organization. Already the Alliance has elected the candidates for governor in Georgia, South Carolina and Tennessee. There will be forty-four Alliance men in the new congress.

Petitions have been circulated throughout the State, asking the legislature to pass a pharmaceutical law. We need a law regulating druggists and apothecaries. We want an examining board and we want druggists and their clerks to be licensed just as in Eastern States. A druggist should have a more thorough knowledge of medicine than a doctor, so that if the latter make a mistake or prescribe an overdose of some dangerous drug he may be able to correct the mistake. There seem to be fewer restrictions upon the drug business in this country than upon any other calling. It is too frequently the case that boys and young men sweep out drug stores and clean capsinors for a few weeks, and pose as full-fledged druggists. As the business is now conducted in some parts of the country, no sooner does the novice learn to distinguish between vini gallici and croton oil than he is ready to dispense drugs. A little legislation in the matter would not be amiss.

In looking over the Athena Press last week we discovered that the editor had appropriated, without credit, the column from the Express called Our Grindstone. The Press has just recently come out biweekly, and we see no good reason why that paper should not be issued daily. That paper is largely made up with reading matter from our columns, and its readers will please remember that whatever good there is in it is to be credited to the LEBANON EXPRESS.
