Work on the Baptist church which was begun sometime since on Bridge Ave., will shortly be resumed and the building put in shape for occupancy. The stone foundation has been completed some time. The lumber is now arriving and the superintending architect Mr. Barrett proposes to push the work.

Judge F. M. Miller has had the dwelling house just north of the Odd Fellows hall, moved back sufficiently to allow the erection of a new store building which he is about to erect. The store will be 80x22 feet two stories. He is also improving the appearance of the dwelling.

Last Friday Alex Purdom formerly of Albany, who has been running his brother Jos' ranch, near Oregon City, had some trouble with a man named Billy Henderson, about some straw. Henderson was determined to pick a fight with Alex and followed him up finally attacking him. Post-master F. M. Miller is daily expecting the arrival of a lot of new post office fixtures, in the way of a front, with 64 lock boxes of bronze metal, 45 alphabetical boxes 170 call boxes, glass, with wire bottom, a neat delivery window and a mail box, all of the regulation pattern; just such an outfit as this growing town needs. The postmaster found his duties in the mail department of Uncle Sam's service very burdensome the first few days of his administration, the mails being large and the public impatient. But now all complaint has died away, and a very satisfactory service is had. Judge Miller will no doubt be a popular official. J. F. Hyde Esq. and Mrs. F. M. Miller are the efficient and accommodating assistants.

Just at this time the minds of the people in and about Lebanon, Albany, Tallman, Sodaville and Waterloo are somewhat agitated over the railroad question. The first of the week the report was that Dr. Hill and associates were to build an electric railroad from Sodaville to Albany via Tallman or via Lebanon conditionally. The plots of the various routes have been prepared and prices of narrow gauge track had from Portland; and a representative dispatched to San Francisco to make enquiry into cost of equipment. Now the rumor is that Mess. J. K. Weatherford and Thomas Kay have made a proposition to the Southern Pacific Ry. Co. to grade the road bed, if the company will complete and operate an extension of the road from Lebanon to Waterloo, and the proposition is said to have been accepted. Engineer E. J. O'Connor is now making survey.
