As a result of the feud in the Masonic fraternity of Ohio, between the northern jurisdiction and the Scottish Rite the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Ohio has been formed and chartered. A remarkable clause in the constitution of the Grand body provides:

"It shall be a fundamental and unchangeable law and landmark of this Grand Lodge it shall recognize as Masonic no degrees in Masonry except these of entered apprentice, fellowcraft, and Master Mason, nor shall it recognize any body as Masonic which confers other than these three degrees.

Pension Commissioner Raum is quoted in a Chicago paper as saying: "Affairs have been going altogether too slow in the pension department, and I am going to hurry through and dump 350,000 original cases upon the various pension agencies of the country before the year is out." In heaven's name, what does the man want! The number of pensioners at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1889, was 37,000 larger than for the previous year, and the increase during the year closing June 30, 1890, was 28,000. These are these are the figures of net increase in each case, after making allowance for the large number of names removed from the roll by death or otherwise. Moreover, these gains were made before the new dependent pension law fairly got into operation, and the report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1891, must inevitably show a vastly larger increase. The "statistical abstract of the United States," just issued from the bureau of statistics, contains the following figures from the pension rolls for four intervals of six years:
