WHAT AN EDITOR THINKS OF
Sodaville and Waterloo.

(From Harbinger Courier.)

We found Sodaville five miles south of Lebanon, beautifully situated on a wooded slope overlooking a broad expanse of productive valley. The business portion of the town comprises one fine two-story hotel, one boarding house, one general store, blacksmith shop, livery stable, drug store, post-office and school house. The place is quite accessible, there being a daily hack run from Lebanon, with which town it is also connected by telegraph. The mineral spring is well developed and cared for, being supplied with brick wall, roof, steps, faucets, etc. The water is very strong in pure soda, and is free to everybody to drink or carry away. The population of the town is about 143, and most of the residents have very neat dwellings. There are at present about 25 families camping here, but large crowds are present every Sunday. It is said here that it is a decided fact that a motor line will soon be built between here and Lebanon.

Two and a half miles east of Sodaville we came to the picturesque little village of Waterloo, situated on the west bank of the Santiam. Here is also found a fine soda spring the water of which is fully equal to that of Sodaville. This town consists of a small store and post-office, hotel and livery stable, with about ten or twelve residences. One of the rarest and most valuable features is its natural water-power which is probably not equalled by any in this part of the state. The river here is spanned by a remarkably fine wooden bridge; and about this romantic little village we find the grandest and most picturesque scenery imaginable. The principal resources of this part of the country are agriculture and fruit raising. The principal outlet of these places is Lebanon, there being a hard smooth road between the places. Although both of these towns are old-settled places, there is at present every indication that within the next few years they will experience an era of decided improvement and development. Property owners in and about Waterloo are now platting extensive additions to the place, and have a force of surveyors at work at present.

Although we were obliged to make hurried observations, and had but a couple of days to tarry, we experienced a pleasant and exhilarating trip, and would fain have prolonged it into weeks.
