Obituary.

G. W. Stillwell was born in Virginia Aug. 28th, 1811, and died in Lebanon, Oregon, Sept. 5th, 1891, at the age of 80 years and 7 days. In his early childhood his father moved with him to the state of Ohio, and when he arrived at the age of thirty years he was married to Miss Susan Fox and in 1854 they moved to the state of Illinois where they lived one year and then moved to the state of Iowa. G. W. Stillwell and Susan Stillwell were the kind and loving parents of ten children of which there were seven boys and three girls. In April 1864 he enlisted in Company F, 33d Reg. Iowa Infantry, and was discharged at the close of the war with all the honors of true American heroism. While he was struggling in the great national contest and offering his life that his children might have peace, his companion and bosom friend, the mother of his children, bid adieu to this world, and being weary, taking her burden for a pillow lay down by the way-side to rest. After his return from the South and finding himself with so many small children and no mother for them he became acquainted with and married Mrs. Nancy Frazier with whom he has lived to the day of his death. He was a consistent member of the Church of the United Brethren from a young man until the end of his life. The noonday has passed and the shadows of his life have for many years been pointing toward the East, and now his children can look back with pride to the purity of his life, and say that their father was a manly man.

B. M. Huston returned this forenoon from the Santiam mines, to which place his teams are taking the new ten stamp mill from Gatesville. Two four-horse teams and five yoke of oxen are used. It required seven days to make the first round trip; but the regular time will be about three days. Two to five thousand pounds are carried by each wagon each trip, hence it will take about twenty days to get the mill in. Superintendent Hazelton has charge of the setting up of the machinery, an assurance that it will be done well. The miners are now 215 feet into the lower tunnel and have been striking it as rich as the best in the upper tunnel. The upper tunnel is in 280 feet and the ore continues first class. The supply is illimitable and will keep the big mill constantly going when started. The prospect increases in brightness.—Democrat.
