ORDINANCE No. 13.

AN ORDINANCE to amend ordinance No. 13, entitled an Ordinance to protect the public health and to prevent the spread of dangerous or contagious diseases within the corporate limits of the city of Lebanon.

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF LEBANON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the disease known as typhoid fever shall be and the same is hereby excepted from the provisions of Ordinance No. 13, entitled "An Ordinance to protect the public health and to prevent the spread of dangerous or contagious diseases within the corporate limits of the city of Lebanon," and the provisions of said ordinance shall not apply to the disease known as typhoid fever.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the Mayor.

SEC. 3. All parts of Ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE No. 13.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 31 of Ordinance No. 7, entitled "An Ordinance relating to the material to be used in, and the manner of building and constructing sidewalks and crosswalks in the city of Lebanon."

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF LEBANON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That Section 31 of Ordinance No. 7, entitled "An Ordinance relating to the material to be used in and the manner of building and constructing sidewalks and crosswalks in the city of Lebanon," be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows, to-wit: "Sec. 3. All crosswalks within the city shall be constructed of red or yellow fir lumber 8 in. by 3 in. or 10 in. by 5 in., evenly sawed and to be nailed on bearings or sleepers of red or yellow fir lumber, not less than 4 in. by 6 in. and oval shaped and there shall be at least four of such bearings or sleepers under each section of crosswalk; said crosswalk shall be from 4 feet to 5 feet wide on the level, that is to say on top, as the council may direct by order, duly made and entered in its journal, the edges to be level and a layer of gravel to be spread on each side of each crosswalk, the gravel to be mixed to the level of the plank."

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after its approval by the Mayor.

SEC. 3. All parts of Ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.
