ORDINANCE No. 19.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 41 of Ordinance No. 3, entitled "An Ordinance concerning offenses and disorderly conduct, defining what shall constitute the same and providing for the punishment thereof."

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF LEBANON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That Section 41 of Ordinance No. 3, entitled "An Ordinance concerning offenses and disorderly conduct, defining what shall constitute the same, and providing for the punishment thereof," shall be amended as follows: "Sec. 41. No person shall ride a bicycle or tricycle on any sidewalk in the city of Lebanon; Provided, that this Section shall not apply to any invalid or cripple who shall use such vehicle for the purpose of travel; and to any child—male or female—under the age of 15 years. Any person violating the provisions of this Section shall, upon conviction thereof before the Recorder's court, be punished by a fine less than five (5) dollars, nor more than fifty (50) dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail not more than twenty-five (25) days."

Sec. 2. All parts of Ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the Mayor.

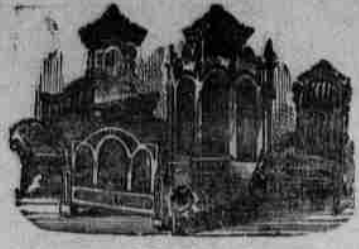
