At last Astoria is to have another railroad on paper. The Southern Pacific should build one at once with ties and rails and locomotives and cars, from the Willamette valley straight to the mouth of the Columbia.

So great is the wheat crop in the Canadian Northwest that if the Canadian Pacific Railway utilizes all the rolling stock it owns or can make or borrow, it will take until next summer to move the grain. At least so says the Winnipeg Tribune.

Speaker Crisp.
