MASS MEETING.

The meeting was called to order by C. B. Montague, who was made permanent chairman and S. O. Wallace Secretary. A memorial to the legislature was then read by C. B. Montague, setting forth the wishes of the mass meeting in regard to the matter under discussion. After speeches by various gentlemen, and with but light opposition, the memorial was passed, with no dissenting vote audible. The matter now rests with the legislature. There is no good reason why the limits of the city should not be extended and it is to be hoped that the legislature will promptly grant the relief asked for. It is the wish of the great majority of people that our representative, Mr. Miller, will use his best endeavors to extend our city limits.

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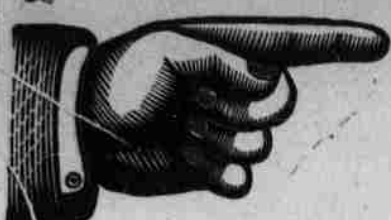
